Prekindergarten to Grade 12 students wear their mask when they are:


- On busses




Grade 1/2




Bredy's Bunch 5/6



Alcohol

Alcohol has been known as a gateway drug. Gateway drugs are typically drugs that although legal introduce people to other drugs that are usually illegal and more addictive. Most individuals living with an addiction start with one or more gateway drugs such as nicotine, alcohol or marijuana.

• We live in an alcogenic culture, which means that alcohol accompanies almost everything we do. As a result, many youth will decide about their alcohol use by the time they graduate, even though it is illegal for them to drink.

- Alcohol is advertised as fun, a pain reliever, a cure for our problems and a way to fit in and be cool. What is not often discussed are the negative effects of alcohol such as addiction, hangovers, break-ups, anger, liver problems, mental health struggles, headaches, nausea and vomiting.
- In August 2020 abone, there were 379 impaired driving charges in Saskatchewan
- In 2019, 21 people were killed in impaired driving crashes in Saskatchewan

Marijuana

Marijuana has been known as a gateway drug. Gateway drugs are typically drugs that although legal introduce people to other drugs that are usually illegal and more addictive. Most individuals living with an addiction start with one or more gateway drugs such as nicotine, alcohol or marijuana.

- Although marijuana has been legalized, this has not changed the effects of the drug
- Marijuana is made from cannabis sativa plant and contains cannabinoids
- THC is a cannabinoid that creates the feeling of a high
- The amount of THC in marijuana can vary and the amount consumed will drastically effect an individual user's experience
- Large amounts of THC can lead to over-intoxication
- The younger a person starts using marijuana and the more THC they consume, the more likely they are to become addicated

Vaping

Vape juice contains nicotine, which has been known to be a gateway drug. Gateway drugs are typically drugs that although legal introduce people to other drugs that are usually illegal and more addictive. Most individuals living with an addiction start with one or more gateway drugs such as nicotine, alcohol or marijuana.

- The drug in vape juice, nicotine, is the same drug as in cigarettes, chewing tobacco, cigars and pipe tobacco
- Even if advertised as not containing nicotine, most vape juices contain nicotine
- Vape juices also contain food additives that while approved for eating are very harmful to breathe into one's lungs
- Most commonly used vape products are produced by the same companies that make cigarrettes
- Until the introduction of vaping, nicotine addiction among young people had significantly decreased
- Addiction to vaping is very similiar to addiction to smoking

This is a guide only; the specifics of each case will be assessed and at times may result in a different decision than indicated above.

Definitions:

<u>Self-Monitor</u>: monitor yourself for symptoms of respiratory illness, such as fever, cough, sore throat and difficulty breathing. Avoid crowded places and increase your personal space from others when possible.

<u>Self-Isolate</u>: stay at home, monitor yourself for symptoms for 14 days, avoid all contact with others and follow local public health authority advice.

<u>Close contact</u>: provided direct care to someone or had direct contact with infectious body fluids of a person without consistent and appropriate use of recommended PPE, lived with or had prolonged contact with a probable or confirmed case.

Casual contact: being in the presence of or having limited direct contact for minimal period/s of time.

SARCAN will then ane a Bolflee count the bottles and donate the money to Eaton School.

Please note: The bottle drive mentioned in option 1 will only occur if COVID safety restrictions allow for it. Student safety will be our top concern.

Please note: If you chose option 2, please make sure to remove the lids from the bottles and sort them as if you were normally taking recyclables to SARCAN as since we will not be handling them, we will not be able to do that as we usually do.

BOARD OF EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

The Sun West School Division Board of Education held its regular meeting on Tuesday, November 24, 2020 and held its Organizational Meeting on November 17. At both meetings, all Board members either participated in person and observed physical distancing protocols or participated virtually via Microsoft Teams.

- At the Organizational Meeting, the current Chair, Karen Itterman (Subdivision No. 3), and the current Vice-Chair John Collins (Subdivision No. 6), were both re-elected to their positions.
- Three new members joined the Board at the Organizational Meeting and Committee assignments were made for the year. The new Board members are Michelle Brummund (Subdivision No. 1), Michele Whitfield (Subdivision No. 2) and Cara Nisbet (Subdivision No. 8).
- At the November 24 meeting, an auditor from the Chartered Accounting Firm of Close, Hauta, Bertois and Blanchette of Kindersley reviewed the 2019-20 audit with the Board. The independent audit demonstrated that Sun West remains on solid financial ground and continues to spend the vast majority of its funds on student instruction. The Independent Auditor's Report will be made public on the Sun West website in the near future once the Ministry of Education has accepted it.
- The Board also reviewed and accepted a preliminary version of Sun West 2019-20 Annual Report that will also be posted on the Sun West website once the Ministry of Education has accepted it.
- The Director of Education provided background and answered Board member questions on recent decisions to tighten health and safety protocols in schools, especially in regard to wearing masks and physical distancing requirements. He explained that changes were made to align Sun West with practices that are highly recommended by Saskatchewan's Chief Medical Officer in keeping with the significant increase in COVID-19 cases that Saskatchewan is currently experiencing.
- The Board set the annual Sun West Public Meeting for Tuesday, March 16, 2021. More details will be forthcoming.
- On November 25-26, Board members attended the Saskatchewan School Boards Association (SSBA) virtual Annual Convention and in preparation discussed the resolutions that were introduced at the meeting. These included resolutions related to Indigenous education, diversity, SSBA internal policies and the delivery of flu vaccines in schools.

The Next meeting of the Board of Education is scheduled for December 15, 2020.
