SUN WEST VIRTUAL P.A.R.T.Y. PROGRAM

Thursday, May 20th

Each year, Sun West students have the opportunity to participate in the P.A.R.T.Y. Program (Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth). This year, Eaton Grade 10 & 11 students will join virtually for a variety of live presentations, pre-recorded video presentations, classroom activities and individual device interaction. The P.A.R.T.Y. Program is an injury prevention program aimed at teens. The purpose is to help educate youth about the consequences of poor decision-making in relation to risk-taking behaviors such as drinking and driving, texting and driving, not wearing a seat belt, and/or not wearing protective gear for high risk physical activities (i.e. snowboarding, skateboarding, snowmobiling, ATVing). Organizer Liza Dahl's goal is to make this day interactive, exciting, interesting, and impactful.

In 2019/20, the School Touring Program presented 46 performances and one 1day juggling residency representing the following disciplines: Juggling, Improv Theatre, and issue based theatre for middle and high school audiences. Total audience numbers were 11,719. There were three tours, involving 53 schools and traveling to 31 communities through out the province. Lead teachers in each school contributed approximately 61 non classroom hours to coordinate these presentations.

MENTAL HEALTH AND COVID-19: WHAT ADULTS AND CAREGIVERS ARE EXPERIENCING AND WHAT THEY CAN DO

Canadian adults and caregivers have been experiencing increased anxiety, depression, stress, and overall lower perceived mental health. This has been especially apparent in women.

Strategies

SOCIAL WORK

Be Kind to Yourself

Practice self-care and take care of the mind, body, and spirit. Carve out times to relax and reflect.

Seek out Support

Speak frequently to someone trusted about feelings. Keep connected to others and do not be afraid to ask for support when needed.

Balance

Caregivers have been experiencing increased responsibilities. Balance stressful situations with participating in enjoyable and/or relaxing activities. Reduce expectations.

Be the Example

Caregivers being kind to themselves will be beneficial for their mental health as well as the mental health of the children they care for. Children will be looking to their caregivers to show ways to cope and proceed despite stressful circumstances.



PSYCHOLOGICAL FIRST AID: PART 1

It is important to recognize the symptoms of psychological discomfort in children during COVID-19. Psychological First Aid (PFA) is an acute intervention for the alleviation of stress for children. The Model - <u>Listen, Protect, Connect, Model, and Teach</u> - is one example of PFA most commonly used by teachers, but applicable for all.

LISTEN CLOSELY

- Listen deeply to the concerns of children and youth.
- Ensure they feel heard, and believed.
- Legitimize what they are saying.

PROTECT

- Re-establish a sense of safety for the child and provide correct
- information about COVID-19.
 Regularly converse. Avoid unknown situations and adults

CONNECT

- Support children in staying virtually connected to their peers, family, and support workers to cope with isolation.
- Create moments of togetherness

TEACH AND MODEL

- Educate children and others on ways to support positive mental health.
- Ensure they know a little bit of stress is normal, and recognize when they may need additional professional support.
- Set an example to show that adults are coping during this time, despite any stress that may be felt.

BOARD OF EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

SCHOOL DIVISION

The Sun West School Division Board of Education held its regular meeting on Tuesday. April 27, 2021 in Rosetown at the Sun West Learning Centre. Board members who participated in person were physically distant while others participated virtually.

Matters discussed by the Board included:

- The Board reviewed and discussed legislation and policies surrounding School Community Councils (SCCs). Board members stressed the important role that SCCs play in helping the Board and schools reach their educational goals and objectives.
- Plans are progressing for a virtual SCC Workshop that will be open to all SCC members and that will take place on May 26. More details will be forwarded to SCCs in the coming days.
- The Board reviewed the preliminary 2021-22 Sun West budget and the input received from the public, staff, and students during the budget consultation process. Next steps in the budget adoption process will include a review by the Board Audit Committee, consultation with stakeholders groups and final approval by the Board of Education prior to the budget being submitted to the Ministry of Education by June 30th for their approval.
- The Board discussed a request for feedback by the Saskatchewan School Boards Association (SSBA) regarding proposed changes to the membership and fee structure of the SSBA. The Board will extend an invitation to Ken Kosolofski, External SSBA Chair for Executive Composition, Membership fees and Voting Review to meet with the Board virtually to explain the proposed changes.
