





Congratulations to the lucky winners of the games: Isabelle S, Jaxen D, Carter D, Paxton S, Elodie B, and Ella B!


Congratulations to the Ronquillo Family who won the Participant Draw from all the families who joined in!



THE ISSUE WITH FORCING YOUR CHILD TO APOLOGIZE

AND WHAT TO DO INSTEAD

A forced apology results in insincere words spoken to avoid conflict or shame. It makes your child feel bad about themselves. Instead, teach your child about **repairing relationships**. When you guide your child to repair the relationship, you'll teach them how to create genuine apologies.





REFRAME THE CONFLICT FOR YOUR CHILD

"I saw you run to the bathroom. As you entered the doorway, you pushed past your sister, causing her to fall backward."

HELP YOUR CHILD RECOGNIZE THE FACTS OF WHAT HAPPENED, FROM ALL POINTS OF VIEW.



TEACH EMPATHY FOR OTHERS

"Your sister looked shocked and then hurt when you pushed her. She is frowning and looking tearful."

VERBALIZE FOR THEM HOW OTHERS FEEL.

SHOW THEM HOW TO RECOGNIZE OTHERS' EMOTIONS.



ENCOURAGE YOUR CHILD TO TAKE OWNERSHIP

"What was your role in this situation?"

GUIDE THEM TO ANSWER WITH HOW THEY ACTED AND WHY THEY ACTED THAT WAY: "I ACTED HASTILY BECAUSE I WANTED TO GET THERE FIRST."



GUIDE YOUR CHILD TO REPAIR THE DAMAGE

"How can we fix this situation?"

BRAINSTORM SUGGESTIONS FOR HOW YOUR CHILD CAN RECTIFY THE PROBLEM.

ENCOURAGE YOUR CHILD TO ASK THOSE INVOLVED: "HOW CAN I MAKE THIS SITUATION BETTER FOR YOU?

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BRAINSTORM IDEAS ON HOW THEY CAN ACT IN SIMILAR SITUATIONS

"Next time, you can ask your sister if you can go first because you're in a hurry."

REMIND THEM THAT EVERYONE MAKES MISTAKES.

POINT OUT THAT CONFLICT RESOLUTION IS A SKILL THAT CAN BE LEARNED.

HELP THEM REPAIR THE RELATIONSHIP

"It sounds like what you are saying..."

HELP THEM PULL ALL THE PIECES TOGETHER: "I CAN SEE THAT YOU FEEL UPSET BY WHAT HAPPENED. I ACTED HASTILY BECAUSE I WANTED TO BE FIRST, I WANT TO MAKE THE SITUATION BETTER - PLEASE GO FIRST AND I'LL WAIT."





Success for all

BOARD OF EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

The Sun West School Division Board of Education held its regular meeting on Tuesday, January 25, 2022 at the Sun West Learning Centre in Rosetown. Meeting highlights included:

- The Board received the Graduation Rates report indicating that as of June 2021, 90% or more of Sun West's Grades 10-12 students met their graduation rate goals. The data excluded Sun West Distance Learning Centre Students who were not full-time students. This rate is better than the provincial average, which is 85%.
- The Board received the Student Support Services report that included updates on current staffing assignments for child and youth counsellors, psychologists, speechlanguage pathologists, occupational therapists and addictions educators. Among topics discussed were how the Adaptive Dimension used as part of Student Support Services programming fits well with Sun West's Personalized electronically Blended Learning (PeBL) philosophy and how the COVID-19 pandemic has increased mental health challenges and is resulting in increasing demands on Student Support Services staff.
- An update on activities at the Sun West Distance Learning Centre (DLC) indicated that
 the DLC has seen a significant increase in enrollment due to COVID-19 and in particular
 there has been an increase in the number of K-6 students enrolled. The DLC also
 continues to build very successful partnerships with Saskatchewan Polytechnic in such
 areas as agriculture and technology. The DLC is considering expanding its offerings in
 music, sports leadership, financial literacy and information technology.
- The Board will respond to a letter from the Opposition Education Critic and include the Minister of Advanced Education. The letter will identify areas where students would benefit-from increased teacher training in areas such as business education, technology and Practical and Applied Arts.
- In February, March and perhaps into April, Board members will be making presentations
 to their school's School Community Councils. The purpose of the presentations will be to
 gather input on potential changes to Sun West's mission statement, vision statement
 and guiding principles.
