Grade 3/4 will continue their work on magnets, and have begun a research project on the town of Eatonia.










Grade 5/6

Sun West students are driving change together



Over 150 students entered Sun West's National Addictions Awareness Week Keychain Design

Contest. All Sun West students between Grades 7-12 had the opportunity to enter the contest where students created artwork suitable for incorporation into a keychain using the National

Addictions Awareness Week theme of "Driving Change Together."

Pictured above are the winners and runner-ups of the National Addictions Awareness Week Keychain Design Contest (left to right) Taylor Kubick of Kindersley Composite School, Heimarie Strydom of Elrose Composite School, Addison Larock of Eaton School and Dezarae Jordan of Dinsmore Composite School.

There were two categories for entry. These were Grades 7-9 and Grades 10-12. The winner in the Grades 10-12 category was Taylor Kubik of Kindersley Composite School. Taylor explained her design as follows: "When I thought of driving change together, I thought of people going through addiction together and reaching out for help. I drew a group of students to show others that addiction is something that you don't have to go through alone and that it's okay to reach out for help from people you trust."

The winner in the Grades 7-9 category was Heimarie Strydom of Elrose Composite School. Heimarie's design incorporated the symbols for change and addictions with a red ribbon to symbolize awareness. She wrote: "I tried writing a message by using symbolize (change, addictions) the meaning of the two symbols combined. Also the ribbon represents spreading awareness. "Taylor's and Heimarie's designs will both be used to produce keychains that will be distributed to all Sun West Grade 10 students during the annual PARTY program events to be held in the spring of 2022.





Grade 12 Timeline

December / January

- Connect with your school's Career Counsellor
- Prepare for Semester 1 final exams, complete projects, etc.
- Review timetable for Sem 2 and talk to Career Counsellor/Principal about any potential adjustments.
- If any Grade 10 to 12 students are interested in the skilled trades, you may want to reach out to your Career Counsellor for further information on the Saskatchewan Youth Apprenticeship Program, related work-based learning courses, and/or Apprenticeship Credits.
- Continue to apply for post-secondary programs of interest.
- Continue to research, prepare, and apply for scholarships.
- Continue to apply being mindful of deadlines if post-secondary is in your plan.
- If post-secondary institutions require official transcripts after January exams, be sure to order them from the Ministry of Education. https://www.k12.gov.sk.ca/etranscript/
- There are now many virtual post-secondary tours, sessions, etc. to help students/families make informed decisions. Do some
 research and take advantage of opportunities of interest to you.

February

- Connect with your school's Career Counsellor
- Continue applying for scholarships.
- Be mindful of various deadlines and confirm deadlines for out of province schools.

March

Continue applications

April

- Continue to apply for programs of interest
- Apply for local scholarships check with your Career Counsellor, School Principal, etc. for details so you do not miss deadlines.
- If planning a Gap Year, seek out supports and plan with intention.
- If planning to work next year, begin planning.

May

- If interested in summer or full-time/part-time, etc. employment, begin to investigate job opportunities, update resume, brush
 up on interview skills, etc.
- For those planning for post-secondary studies, watch email and student accounts for updates regarding registration, orientation days, etc.
- Update your myBlueprint Grad Plan Portfolio with any current skills, update your resume, add any certifications or showcases, reflect on your learnings, share your portfolio with your Career Counsellor and a trusted adult, etc.

Student Career News



COURSE SELECTION With a new semester on the horizon, Grade 10-12 students may be exploring changes or making future choices for their planned high school courses. It is important to consult with your Principals and Career Counsellors before making any drastic changes to ensure adjustments meet needed graduation requirements, fit with your personalized plan, and align with post-secondary aspirations. There are a number of unique high school opportunities to consider.

Career Education 9: All Grade 9 students will begin developing a Graduation and PostGraduation plan using myBlueprint.

Students utilize the tool to learn more about their learning styles, understand personality types, set life/career goals, investigate occupations, etc. Parents are key influencers in the life/career decisions of youth and can gain access to this resources. If interested, please contact your Career Development Teacher.

Grade 10 Students: Grade 10 students will progress with life/career investigations utilizing myBlueprint planning program as an ePortfolio tool. They will be revisiting inventories, reflecting and updating goals, and continuing to investigate various options as part of their Grad and Post-Graduation Plan. These investigations along with career conversations with the school's Career Counsellor, can help students explore possibilities such as high school courses, postsecondary studies, gap year possibilities, travel options, leadership opportunities, etc.

Grade 11 Students: Grade 11 students will be completing the CAPS/COPS/COPES career assessment inventories to help them further explore their interests, values, and skills then examine how their personalized strengths and interests align with various occupations. This is another career planning tool our school division provides in support of life/career explorations. Grade 11's may also want to consider attending post-secondary information sessions open to high school students to help make decisions about future possibilities.

Grade 12 Students: This is a very important time to continue to research and make informed life/career decisions for the first steps upon graduation. Scholarship opportunities still exist! Interested in seeking \$\$? See scholarship section of this newsletter. If students have applied for post-secondary institutions, a transcript request may have to be sent.

TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS



Online Request for High School and Adult 12 Transcripts

Transcript Requests: For any students applying for post-secondary institutions, you may need to send a transcript that indicates the subjects you have taken. Most institutions will require you to request transcripts from the Ministry of Education. There is a non-refundable search and process fee involved. Students can select up to 5 requests (including sending to self) for this fee. Students will require personal information, Saskatchewan Learning ID (if known), valid credit card and card holder information if paying online, valid email address, etc. before beginning the process. Depending on what the post-secondary institution requires, students may select various options. Each time a "What is your situation" selection is made, click on "Add to Cart" button to make another selection. Note: "After January Exams 2022" and "After June Exams 2022" are commonly requested.

BOARD OF EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

The Sun West School Division Board of Education held its regular meeting virtually on Tuesday, November 23, 2021. Meeting highlights included:

- The Board passed the 2020-21 Sun West Annual Report. The Report will now be sent to the Ministry of Education for their review and acceptance. Once the Report is accepted by the Ministry, it will be posted on the Sun West website.
- The Annual Report indicated that Sun West continues to spend the bulk of its funding on students and student-related costs. While 95% of the Sun West budget is spent on instruction, facilities and transportation only 4% is spent on governance and administration. Spending on instruction increased to 70% of the total budget compared to 68% in the last fiscal year.
- The annual audited financial statement for Sun West was presented by auditors and was accepted. The statements will be included in the Sun West 2020-21 Annual Report.
- The Board accepted Administrative Procedure (AP) 126-1 COVID-19 Vaccination or Proof of Negative Test. This procedure comes into effect on January 1, 2022 and outlines the requirements for Sun West employees and others who work closely with students to provide either proof of full vaccination or a recent negative COVID-19 diagnostic test.
- Once AP 126-1 was announced, staff began reporting their vaccination status and to date over 700 of approximately 900 full-time staff have reported they are fully vaccinated making for a vaccination rate of approximately 95%.
- Sun West also held two Committee of the Whole meetings during November and the Board attended the Saskatchewan School Boards Association (SSBA) Annual General Meeting. The Southern Representative for the SSBA will be invited to an upcoming Board meeting to discuss SSBA matters.
